The leaf pick-up season has begun and I would ask everyone to call Borough Hall if leaves are blocking the sidewalks and causing a dangerous situation. My thanks to Bruce Whitaker and Gene Siembieda for organizing the Centennial Golf Outing on October 14. It was a great fund-raising event. We do not use any taxpayer dollars for any of the Centennial events. The Parade Committee including Ken Riley, Joe Barnes, Ernie Larrat, Gene Sobeck, Jr., Ann Marie Snyder, Matt Riley and Gene Sobeck are to be commended for the parade. It was a very successful event. We were blessed with a beautiful fall day and I think it will be remembered for a long, long time. My congratulations to Councilmen Siemsen and Vozech on their re-election to the Council. I look forward to working with them for the next 3 years.

H. BOROUGH ATTORNEY – Peter A. Scandariato, Esq. No comments.

J. BOROUGH CLERK – Meredith Bendian

I would like to thank my staff for their help on Election Day, including Sherry Richards, Irene Zdanis, Virginia Chiocco, and Thom Price. My thanks also to Nick and Chief Gurney, as well as the Principals of the schools, for their cooperation and assistance in making parking available at the schools. Mayor Botta expressed his appreciation to Meredith for taking a pro-active approach with the parking.

VIII. PUBLIC COMMENT

Doug Hymans, 32 Rose Avenue, read his e-mail to the Mayor regarding the park on Martis and Rose Avenues. Mr. Hymans owns one of the dogs who used to frequent the park and the person who complained about the puppy play date approached Mrs. Hymans several months ago and expressed her concerns about all the dogs. All the dog owners agreed to cut back on the number of days that they would be there. We now find signs posted saying that we can no longer allow our dogs in the park at all. All of us always cleaned up after our dogs and we never left any of their waste there. In fact, many of us cleaned up after the few other people in the neighborhood who did not clean up after their dogs. We also cleaned up the litter so that none of the dogs would try to eat the garbage left behind by some of the locals. Many of the neighborhood children would come to the park to play with the dogs. I understand that many people may be afraid of dogs but to not allow any dogs in the park because, as we have been told, they “fear for their life” is ludicrous. All of the dogs are docile and never presented a threat. Many of the neighbors thought it was a fun thing and they were glad to see such a social event involving the dogs. When we bought our home, we were told the park would never be developed. How can rules that apply to a recreational field or town park be applied to this area? Is there an ordinance that says dogs cannot walk through this area? This appears to be a neighborhood feud. Mr. Hymans read a letter from Carol and Andrew Lander who live at 433 Elizabeth Avenue expressing their concerns regarding dogs in the park. Mayor stated that complaints had been received from more than one individual and we are not perceiving you as an offender.

Patty Hymans, 32 Rose Avenue, read a prepared statement regarding the park on Martis and Rose Avenues. A lot of positive things came out of the gatherings there and the neighborhood really came together. Mahwah and Allendale have areas, as well as Ridgewood, that are set aside for dog walking. Most towns do not restrict people from walking their dogs as long as the rules are followed and people clean up after them. Why is this such a problem here? We do not want a dog park and I would like to know if there have been any incidences where the police have been called? I would hope that we will be allowed back into the park. Patty also read a letter from Susan Schaffel of Bedford Place expressing her desire to walk her dog again at the park,

which created a sense of community in the neighborhood. Parks should be more than just a place for organized sports. There was also a letter from the Stacy family at 1 Armstrong Avenue. Mayor stated that the park is maintained by the Borough as a “park”.

Betsy Sabatini Coyne, 64 Refy Avenue, stated that for many years people have been walking their dogs through this field. Her father was Borough Engineer in the ‘60’s. The stream makes the field too wet for kids to play and it became a perfect spot for dogs since there are no sidewalks in our area. We never heard any complaints and she requested that the signs be taken down. Ms. Coyne also read a letter from Jennifer Imperato, 23 Rose Avenue, expressing her concerns about the field in question. Mayor stated that the Borough has an ordinance in place that says dogs are not permitted on recreational fields in town. That is in effect for that parcel of land. Mayor indicated that a committee would be looking into finding a suitable place for a dog run or dog park. Borough Administrator added that the previous Mayor and Council introduced and allowed the Soccer Association to use that field for practices. They decided to find other suitable sites. Ms. Coyne stated that the signs are an eyesore. Mayor stated that there were complaints of lots of activity at the field with dogs.

John Giammarino, 327 Maple Street, stated that this park has been very important socially. He has met a lot of people and made a lot of friends and asked if unnamed is different than undeveloped? Mayor stated that the interpretation we are using is that it is a developed park. Mr. Giammarino stated that he would like to see the signs removed, since the people in this area are not going to travel across town to a dog park. Mayor stated that we cannot limit the field to residents of the area.

Joanne Bambrick, 21 Rose Avenue, asked about the complaints. Mayor stated that there were numerous complaints about the park in terms of gathering on many nights during the summer. Ms. Bambrick stated that there is an entire congregation of people who have used this park for over 20 years and now less than 5 complaints are taking it away. It is a great neighborhood. There are always more adults than dogs and we have met many neighbors there. I feel like we have been let down. I don’t understand how 5 complaints could change a community like this. Can ordinances be changed?

Mayor stated that yes, ordinances can be changed. The process is handled by the Council. You can continue to send e-mails, come to meetings, let your voice be heard. Ms. Bambrick stated that she never saw non-residents coming to that park with their dog. We heard that Councilman Jones is good friends with the person who complained. Mayor stated that personal attacks have nothing do with enforcing an ordinance as it has been on the books.

Councilman Jones stated that he has received about 25 e-mails about this and he knows a lot of people. I have coached with about 50 people in town since I have 3 children. This ordinance has always been on the books. It is like the overnight parking. It doesn’t become an issue until someone complains about it. There is also two-hour parking on Main Street. There has been more than one family complaining about the dogs. Many of the e-mails were sent to the Mayor and people came at it more from a public safety issue. There were complaints that children were being chased by dogs. The ordinance has been there for many years. It becomes an enforcement issue because the police cannot enforce it, if it is not posted. Ms. Bambrick stated that we don’t know if

the people who complained were exaggerating or if they made up things and we did not have the opportunity to explain our side. Ms. Bambrick read a letter from Peter Hakkenberg of 51 Rose Avenue expressing his hope that the signs will be removed. Councilwoman Dillon added that we did not just take away your rights. We have an obligation to enforce ordinances. Dogs are not permitted in parks. If something were to happen with a child and a dog, we could be sued because we did not enforce the ordinance. That impacts all of us.

Michael Bambrick, 21 Rose Avenue, asked about how we go about getting the ordinance changed? Mayor stated that the Council has the authority to change a law. It is up to them to determine if it is in the best interest of the 14,500 people in the community to change the law. You are influencing that right now. Mayor stated that he would be willing to establish a committee to look for a dog park or dog run area. The committee would consist of various Councilpeople, and the Recreation Commission. Mr. Bambrick stated that he would be willing to petition the Council. Mayor stated that we believe that the ordinance, as it is enacted, should stay. Borough Attorney Scandariato added that an ordinance has to apply to the entire community. Should this Council decide that they wish to amend the ordinance, everyone could use the property in question. The Council has to be very careful in crafting whatever they are going to do because it isn't just going to affect you. It is going to affect the entire community. We cannot change the definition of a "park". Mr. Bambrick suggested reclassifying this particular piece of land. Councilman Jones stated that when we try to enact something to resolve an issue, we send out a letter and the other side usually comes forth with their issues. If we were to change it to what you want and 300 people starting walking their dogs there, the other people would say it is a nightmare.

Denise Luca, 36 Refy Avenue, asked about e-mails and Mayor decided to call Ms. Hymans instead of responding to each e-mail. Ms. Luca read a prepared letter regarding her experience with meeting people and gathering together with dogs at the park. Ms. Luca also read a letter from a neighbor expressing her enjoyment about the park. Ms. Luca read another letter from the Zillianis of 2 Armstrong Avenue also expressing their enjoyment of the park. Ms. Luca stated that she felt that she was being treated unjustly. There is no safe area for people to walk with their dogs.

Patty Hymans, 32 Rose Avenue, stated that every town that she has lived in has had a park where children played and people could walk their dogs. There needs to be clear cut rules. We just want a safe place to walk our dogs. I would like to see the ordinance changed.

Patty Gorsuch, 19 Anne Avenue, stated that her house backs up to this park and my dog does not go to this park. She has a big dog and it did not work for her but it did work for these people. If the dogs are leashed, then there should be no reason to be afraid of them. I just want to be able to walk through the park, and to clean up after my dog. For 25 years, I have been picking up beer bottles, wine bottles, poop. Since these people have been there, it hasn't been a mess and they take the time to clean up. There has to be something we could do. I would hope that you don't brush this off but really consider what we are saying. Ramsey should be a progressive town that listens to all of its people.

Mike Coyne, 64 Refy Avenue, stated that he lived in Ramsey for 18 years and until 2 years ago, he did not know any of the people who were here tonight. Now, they are all friends. I am requesting that you think about this. Could you please put a garbage can there for the kids to put their beer and wine bottles. Mayor stated that if kids have beer and wine, you should call the police.

Patty Gorsuch read a letter from Mr. and Mrs. Jenkins, 27 Anne Avenue, asking about the signs and requesting that the signs be removed.

Doug Rennie, 30 Rose Avenue, spoke about the lack of sidewalks in his area and every year, he is advised that it is going to be on the agenda. It will be 46 years in January and nothing has been done, mainly on South Central. It is not fair to us; we are taxpayers.

Not seeing anyone else who wished to speak, Mayor closed the public comment. Mayor stated that we will consider all aspects of this issue.
